# Delegates take law and court procedure class, bar exam

On Tuesday May 30th, Chief Justice Steven Jensen gave a presentation on law and court procedure. Chief Justice Jensen was appointed in 2017 by Governor Dennis Daugaard. He was then chosen by his colleagues in 2021 to be Chief Justice. Chief Justice Jensen goes into detail explaining our government, the three different types of our governments, and the ins and outs of the judicial branch.

He goes over the rights of the people in court. Specifically, the Miranda Rights: the right to remain silent, anything you say can and will be used against you in the court of law, you have the right to an attorney, if you cannot afford one, one will be provided for you, if you decide to answer questions now without an attorney present, you will have the right to stop answering at any time until you talk to an attorney.

Chief Justice Jensen also mentioned the rights of the accused. One of the main metaphors he used involved his hand. If you put your hand up, you can only see one side of it. He says, "You really haven't seen my hand until you've seen the other side," he uses this to explain cross-examination. You try and get the story from both perspectives.

A big part of the trial process is a term called "mens rea" which is the intent to commit the crime. It determines what sentence the criminal gets. 95% of cases are resolved prior to trial due to plea bargaining.

The only case where mens rea doesn't apply is during an insanity plea. Insanity is a defense to a crime, not mental illness. The insanity plea is where a person admits their actions, but they were experiencing and not aware of their

psychosis and not aware of their actions.

When interviewing Chief Justice Jensen, we learned more about the inner workings of ALA Girls State. Our interviewer asked if this was his first-time giving the presentation for Law and Court. His response was that he has been doing it for four or five years. When asked about the test he said this:

"They make the test, they just show me what's on it, and I talk about the topics that I think are significant."

# Delegates Learn About Law Enforcement

On Tuesday afternoon, delegates immersed themselves in the history and changing dynamics of United States law enforcement in a class led by Michael Burgeson. The presentation prepared participants not only for their possible state leadership roles but also for their future as informed citizens.

From ancient Rome to the present day, Burgeson covered every aspect of how policing has developed with the differing needs of historical eras to teach delegates the intricacies of different law enforcement roles. Using his 29 years of experience in military and law enforcement, along with nine years as an adjunct professor at USD, he broke down the branches of the United States policing system for all delegates to understand. Through this, Burgeson fulfilled his desire to educate delegates about the systems surrounding them and bolster their leadership skills.

"I like working with leaders who want to be here and who want to make a difference in our world," said Burgeson.

With growing public concern about law enforcement systems and potential problems within them, Burgeson sees this education as an avenue for citizens to deepen their knowledge about law enforcement and the systems within it.

"In the past few years, things have changed quite a bit. Society's thoughts on law enforcement have been a little bit negative," said Burgeson. "I'm not saying that it's justified or unjustified. What I'm saying is that there's a respect level that is not where it used to be. We're trying to build that respect back and bad things have happened. I'm not saying that they haven't. But when bad things happen, we have to be even more transparent, more respectful, ensure and show that we are the good guys, every time."

As for the delegates, Emma Vandenbark of Detroit came to the class because of her interest in forensics, and she left with her most enjoyment coming from learning about the history of the police force. Anna Leuning of Detroit took an interest in the class because her dad is an agent for the Department of Criminal Investigation; however, she left with her own interest

in the hands-on examples that Burgeson described throughout the class. After the presentation, delegates took an exam testing their knowledge of law enforcement, and the top scores will be announced on Friday at General Assembly.

In his speech, Burgeson pointed out that only approximately 13% of officers in 2013 were women; In South Dakota, women make up only approximately 7% of all full-time officers. By discussing this discrepancy with the delegates, he highlighted the importance of making law enforcement more representative of the population, and how it is vital to create any truly understanding agency.

"Women who are victims of crime, want to connect with women law enforcement officers because they tend to understand them a little bit better. So, it's hard for a male to understand sometimes what a woman is going through...what I can do is get the right person there to assist," said Burgeson. "We can continue to encourage and show not only women but males also, why law enforcement is needed in our society."

High of 87° 24% chance of precipitation


