Even before she got to Girls State, Sophie Spier had her eye on the prize. Sophie is running for the governor position, a goal that she's held close ever since her older sister was elected a decade ago. After Thursday morning's General Assembly, her goal is even closer to becoming a reality. One candidate was chosen from both the Nationalists and the Federalists, to represent their party in the gubernatorial race. Spier was chosen to represent the Federalist Party.

With background experience, a plan for the improvement of Girls State, and the support of her fellow delegates, Spier feels she is ready to embody the role of governor. She calls on her participation in several student council associations and National Honor Society to propel her forward as a strong leader and agent of community service and improvement.

Although it may not be seen by all the delegates, the road to becoming governor comes with adversities that take dedication. Wednesday night, Spier was "up until two in the morning making posters" to prepare for the following caucus and primary elections.

She emphasizes that her favorite part of the campaigning process is that "so many girls are just so excited to pitch in and help." When asked about why she believes herself to be a good fit for governor, Spier happily shared her own mantra: "I've slowly grown into this mindset that life is more focused on the impact you can make rather than the impact it makes on you."

She works to implement this vision by allowing herself to be influenced by her surroundings while also inspiring those around her. Sophie cites Nyapal Chuol, last year's governor, as "a friendly face that everyone can look to." She hopes to continue this example and motivate future generations of Girls State.

Unfortunately, not all of Spier's campaign process has been positive. Just yesterday, Sophie learned that one of her friends had passed away. This tragic loss is painful for all of us, but Sophie promises to stay strong.

"Her name is Sophie, too. She's beautiful. I'm going to do this for her," Spier asserts, recalling her friend's life. Despite these challenges, Spier is going forward with a bright smile and even brighter hopes for the upcoming election.

To help the Girls State candidates, current governor Nyapal Chuol shared some important insights into her experience she had while running and gave some helpful advice for the delegates.

When asked what the

most difficult thing she experienced while running for governor was, she mentioned that public speaking in a large setting clouded her with fear, which was quite unsettling. However, Governor Chuol stated that she was most thankful for her support system, especially her counselors and – strikingly – her running mate.

It was helpful to have someone that was experiencing the same pressure as herself. This group of people allowed Chuol to be more confident as she continued in the election process.

Since there were the only two people going through the same thing, she stated that it was important to stay close to them as they could relate to the fear in a way nobody else could.

Another imporant thing

to keep in mind when running for office is that "whatever happens, happens" as Governor Chuol stated. "Getting as far as a governor nominee is anamazing accomplishment, don't downplay your success if you don't win. Having time to yourself and getting away from the heat of it all for a while is a good time to clear your mind and gather your thoughts.

Perhaps the most important advice of all was "doing it scared." There's no way to completely ease the fear you are experiencing, so embracing it is the way to go. Stay confident in yourself and try not to worry about what others think and see where it goes.

In our self-care guide, we talked about setting boundaries with your time and activities. Governor Chuol even reinforces this ideology.

Chuol says that, although the elections were important to her, don't lose a part of yourself to them. This can overwhelm experiences at ALA Girls State, and perhaps even ruin them. Setting time away from the competitiveness and just enjoying yourself will create everlasting memories of happiness at ALA Girls State!

Located in Yankton, SD, the radio station provides news, sports, and of course, music, to its listeners.

Jeff will typically start his day bright and early with recording segments and editing clips to make his time on air go smoothly.

Delegates learn self-defense

On Thursday afternoon, delegates gathered in the auditorium to learn the basics of self-defense from Shane Toupal.

During the demonstration, Toupal taught moves from wrist rolls to foot stomps to highlight the importance of self-preservation and situational awareness.

As a current federal park ranger and prisoner transporter with decades of military experience, Toupal developed his situational awareness through his exploits.

Now, he can use his own lessons

learned to teach others.

Joined by his son Mark to illustrate the tactics, Toupal began his presentation by stressing the seriousness surrounding the tragic topic of assault. Despite the weight of the conversation, Toupal brought humor to it, thus engaging delegates and teaching them lasting strategies to use when in dangerous situations.

As self-defense classes become more popular, he believes that people are starting to understand the severity of all acts of

> assault, however, people must keep progressing to become a fully understanding society.

"I think one of the things that we as a culture have done is advanced to a point where we understand that a lot of these things do happen, and we need to stop victim blaming," said Toupal. "I believe that self-defense has helped address that."

Because women have higher rates of victimhood, especially concerning sexual assault, the lessons shown are all the more important to teach these strategies at Girls State.

Toupal continued to move beyond just exemplifying the physical moves that people can use for self-protection and explained the vitality of reaching out to others when struggling after any act of violence.

"I think [self-defense classes] can make people aware that even if they have been victims of sexual assault, or even physical assault, it's in their very best interest that they seek help," said Toupal. "Emotional and mental health is paramount. Ultimately, self-defense is about mental health...we want somebody to be prepared to avoid these situations, and if they're in them to be able to recover from that"
